Binoculars + Young Students = New Recruits to Birding

Many students quickly become interested in birds once they learn a bit about them and are able to watch them through binoculars. In support of the Mesilla Valley Audubon Society education outreach program led by C.J. Goin, MVAS earlier this year purchased 20 Vortex Raptor 6.5 X 32 binoculars. C.J. has already used the binoculars with students on outdoor education field trips.

C.J. has been busy this spring with in-class presentations and field trips with students from Conlee Elementary, Hermosa Heights Elementary, Tombaugh Elementary, and Rio Grande Elementary in Hatch.

"I've known for some time that you can only bring home the importance and intrigue of our southwest New Mexico birds by being able to see them up close. The binoculars of course are available for all Audubon programs, but the real payoff for me as an educator is the excitement of kids when they first zoom in on a bird in the





Monarch Butterfly Citizen Science

The October field trip will be a two-part Monarch Butterfly Survey & Tagging citizen science endeavor. Steve Cary, who presented the March monthly program on Monarchs, will lead the group, starting at Placitas Arroyo above Hatch at 4 p.m. Saturday Oct. 7. Participants will leave Las Cruces at 2 p.m. from the NE corner of the K-Mart parking lot off U.S. 70 (the end closest to the Shell Station). Carpooling will be arranged on site with an estimated return time of 8 p.m.

Group size will be first 12 people to sign up.

Sunday's outing will begin at 8 a.m. the in the southern Las Cruces Dam parking lot. The survey and tagging site is along the east side of the foot of the dam. You can bring your own butterfly nets, and some will be provided also.

MVAS Birding ID Course in September, October

Scratching your head wondering what that yellow bird is in your tree? Curious why your favorite birds are only here part of the year? Mesilla Valley Audubon Society (MVAS) is offering a four-week beginners course to improve your birding skills as MVAS instructors guide you through various birding ID techniques. You will be introduced to various field guides; IDing birds by shape, size and silhouettes; identify waterfowl & raptors; native plants that best attract birds to your yard; and more. The course includes four field trips to local hot spots. Join us to explore the wonderful world of birds! Course runs **Mondays, 6:30–8:30 p.m., Sept. 25 through Oct. 16**. On the following **Saturday after each class, a field trip will be conducted** to a local hot spot for birding.

Classes will be at the Southwest Environmental Center, 275 N. Main St., Las Cruces, on the downtown mall.
